"Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them."

Think About It

Jesus and a core group of disciples went up the mountain to pray and there, Jesus was transfigured before them. There are echoes back to Moses in the Old Testament as well as back to the beginning of Mark's Gospel at Jesus' baptism. It is almost as if this is a strategically placed reminder of who Jesus is and what Jesus' mission is in the middle of the Gospel so that everything ties together. Think about the role of the mountain top in this scripture: it serves as a marker of a special event – a "mountain top experience." And think about how your spiritual journey has been marked by important events along the way. Why not use the notes section below to map out your spiritual journey.

Weekly Words

from Senior Minister Bill Morgan



"The Lord's Prayer is not your Father's Prayer"

"Pray then in this way: Our Father..." Matthew 6: 9

Anyone remember the new car ad campaign based on the tagline: "This is not your father's car!?" The thrust was that in the past cars had been tame, sedate sedans. But the new models were sleek, sporty, breathtakingly powerful.

In THE GREATEST PRAYER: REDISCOVERING THE REVOLUTIONARY MESSAGE OF THE LORD'S PRAYER, John Dominic Crossan explores how our basic prayer is less tame and more breathtakingly powerful than we often fathom. The eminent Bible scholar crisscrosses both Testaments to clarify all Jesus packs into his prayer.

To address God in the Aramaic-Greek combination of Abba-Father – "Our Father" – expresses that God is never just your Father or my Father, but that the lifegiver of us all bridges every wall of separation we humans erect between ourselves and our fellow travelers on planet earth.

"The prayer begins with 'Our Father,' that is, with a communal 'our,' rather than just an individual 'my.' The prayer certainly is 'personal,' but personal in community rather than personal in privacy. You may certainly pray it alone, but you are never alone when you pray it." (p. 47)

Crossan would likely agree any prayer is better than no prayer, that when we pray our hearts God can sort it out. But based on scripture in general and Jesus' prayer in particular, there is a growing direction in mature prayer. We always pray our "help us" petitions and our "thank you" praises, but the full force is our prayers for God's empowerment, the guts and grace to live in our relationships and world in God's way, not our way. Speaking of "world," the Lord's Prayer is breathtakingly this-worldly. No denying hope for beyond this life, Jesus calls us to live with love and justice here and now. In Biblical times, the term "kingdom" was quite political. To speak of living in a way that brings "God's heaven kingdom way on earth" is a holy challenge to all earthly powers than come and go across the sea of time. It's about daily bread for us all. It's about forgiveness-reconciliation in all our human relationships: personal, corporate, and political.

On Ash Wednesday, the 22nd, we begin seven weeks of Lent to Easter. In worship and study, our focus is THE LORD'S PRAYER FOR EVERYONE. At whatever place in life, from children memorizing the prayer for the first time, to us well-on-our-life-waysters, we get to take the next step in discovering how this prayer guides and empowers us to follow Jesus and serve others. If the Lord's Prayer hasn't taken your breath yet, stay tuned. But wait, there's even more: most of all, the Lord's Prayer gives us the breath to live with joy, serve with love, die with hope. Message from our dads: hey, we got it; now it's your turn.
